DEFENDANT INTERNET CORPORATION FOR ASSIGNED NAMES AND NUMBERS' REQUEST FOR JUDICIAL NOTICE IN SUPPORT OF ITS MOTION TO DISMISS CERTAIN CAUSES OF **ACTION FOR FAILURE TO STATE** A CLAIM UNDER FRCP 12(B)(6)

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PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that, pursuant to Federal Rule of Evidence 201, defendant Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers ("ICANN")

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ICANN'S RJN CV 04-1368 ABC (CWx)

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hereby respectfully requests that, in considering its concurrently-filed motion to dismiss, pursuant to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 12(b)(6), the Court take judicial notice of the following documents:

- (A) Order Denying Plaintiffs' Motion for Preliminary Injunction in Dotster, Inc., etc. v. Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers, Case No. CV 03-5045 JFW (MANx) (C.D. Cal. Nov. 10, 2003) ("Dotster litigation"), a true and correct copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A;
- (B) Stipulation and Proposed Order for Dismissal with Prejudice in Dotster, Inc., etc. v. Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers, Case No. CV 03-5045 JFW (MANx) (C.D. Cal. Dec. 5, 2003), a true and correct copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit B.

These documents constitute facts not reasonably subject to dispute. Accordingly, they may be properly considered in connection with the Court's consideration of ICANN's Rule 12(b)(6) Motion to Dismiss.

LEGAL STANDARD

A federal district court may properly take notice of "matters of public record" pursuant to Federal Rule of Evidence section 201, to the extent they are not subject to reasonable dispute. *Lee v. City of Los Angeles*, 250 F.3d 668, 689-90 (9th Cir. 2001). Judicial notice of matters of public record will not convert "a Rule 12(b)(6) motion to a summary judgment motion." *Id.* at 689; *Mir v. Little Co. of Mary Hospital*, 844 F.2d 646, 649 (9th Cir. 1988) (same); *Neilson*, 290 F. Supp. 2d at 1112 n.37 (C.D. Cal. 2003) (same).

ARGUMENT

Judicial notice of the attached two documents is necessary to give the Court a more complete understanding of the facts upon which Plaintiffs' entire complaint rests and the prior adjudication of those issues in the *Dotster* litigation.

Dotster Order Denying Motion for Preliminary Injunction

Plaintiffs contend that ICANN has breached the Registrar Accreditation Agreement ("RAA") that ICANN entered into with each Plaintiff by allowing VeriSign to proceed with the Wait Listing Service ("WLS"). (See, e.g., FAC ¶¶ 4.59-68, 16.5-16.28.) However, Plaintiffs are pursuing a claim that was already decided by Judge Walters in November 2003. The existence of Judge Walter's opinion in the *Dotster* litigation thus provides strong support for why Plaintiffs' breach of contract claim against ICANN should fail.

The *Dotster* plaintiffs brought a motion for preliminary injunction seeking to stop ICANN from permitting VeriSign to proceed with WLS; ICANN vigorously opposed the motion, and Judge Walter denied it. The *Dotster* order is a record of this Court and is being offered for the existence of the order, the identity of the named parties, the subject of the dispute, and the Court's determinations. The order is not a fact subject to reasonable dispute, and it is maintained by the clerk of this Court. Therefore, the *Dotster* order may be judicially noticed. *Lee*, 250 F.3d at 689.

Dotster Stipulation and Proposed Order for Dismissal with Prejudice

Similarly, the fact that the *Dotster* plaintiffs stipulated to dismiss their claims with prejudice after Judge Walters issued his November 2003 Order is strong evidence that Plaintiffs' breach of contract claim against ICANN is without merit. The *Dotster* dismissal with prejudice is a record of this Court and is simply being offered for the existence of the dismissal with prejudice, the identity of the named parties, and the subject of the dispute. The dismissal with prejudice is not a fact subject to reasonable dispute, and it is maintained by the clerk of this Court.

3	CONCLUSION
